Executive offices are not the only opportunities to contribute to the organization. Your regions and divisions are collecting nominations and holding elections at their meetings during the Toledo conference. To nominate for these Leadership Assembly offices contact your current Regional Director or Division Chair.

Regions that seat new Regional Directors in January are as follows: NE, SE, SW and W. Most already have an RD-Elect in place, but do check with your Regional Director directly or in their article in this issue. The following regions may be voting for RD-Elect during the Toledo conference meeting; C, E, EC, NC and NW. Again, check with your region directly.

Regions that seat new Public Relations/ Advocacy Chairs in January are as follows: C, E, EC, NC and NW. Most regions typically do not have a PR-Elect and will be taking nominations and voting at your region's meeting in Toledo at the conference. Again, check with your Regional Director directly or in their article in this issue for more information.

**Divisions that seat new Chairs for a two-year term starting January 1, 2018:** Elementary, Emeritus, Higher Ed., Museum and SPA (Supervision, Policy, Admin). This summer, I had the honor of attending the 50th year of Harvard's Project Zero Classroom (PZC). This five-day experience is something that has been on my professional bucket list for almost a decade. I applied for the institute with no support from my district because it was something I wanted to do to nurture my professional career. Thankfully, after I was accepted to PZC, I was able to gain partial funding from the Ohio Art Education Foundation Teacher Enrichment Grant (applications due April 1st) and the Ohio Arts Council.

Project Zero was founded in the idea that learning in the arts should be studied as a cognitive activity. This was the single, founding idea! From this perspective, the following five throughlines were designed to guide research and learning for this year's Project Zero Classroom:

- What does it mean to understand? How does it develop?
- What are the roles of reflection and assessment in learning?
- How can we nurture critical thinking and creativity?
- How can we design for a variety of learners and contexts?
- How can we continue our learning with others after the PZC?

The PZC daily schedule has three main parts, here is the breakdown:

**Plenary Sessions-** Large group "lecture style" sessions facilitated by Harvard PZC faculty and researchers. These sessions

are themed with the PZC throughlines. Harvard professors weave their research visions with the PZC throughlines to explore essential questions in education. These sessions are where you experience the greats of education: Howard Gardner, David Perkins, Ron Ritchhart, etc.

Mini Sessions- Experiential workshops with PZC faculty, these sessions are chosen in advance through a pre-registration system. They function a lot like the OAEA conference workshops. Educators from around the world come to be part of the PZC faculty and their knowledge is based on real world applications.

**Study Groups-** Small group sessions, lead by two PZC faculty and one PZC fellow and design for collaborative inquiry and reflection. This space allowed for us to process the plenary and mini sessions. Getting to know the other 18 people in my group was one of the most valuable parts of the institute. Thinking routines and models were used as tools for reflection while also becoming relevant tools for my classroom.

## What to know if you are thinking of applying for PZC:

- The window for applying opens sometime in December and closes in early January. There is a mailing list you can sign up for alerts.
- PZC encourages teams from districts to attend so that the learning can continue throughout the school year. I was fortunate enough to get accepted as an individual.

- From what I could tell, I was possibly one of a few art educators. I never came across another person with a visual arts background. More art educators should attend PZC!
- Be sure to check your emails for PZC communications, if accepted, there is a little pre-program work and you will sign up for your mini courses about a month before the program.
- You will gain 31 contact hours for your time spent at Project Zero Classroom.

The PZC institute brought together 362 educators from around the world, 30% of them represented 32 different countries. Getting to collaboratively learn in a space created for nationally and internationally trained educators was transformative. Now, because of Project Zero Classroom 2017, the way I see and view my role as an educator in the art room and my school has completely shifted. Project Zero Classroom is the kind of professional development that nurtures the soul of an educator. Honestly, PZC aligns with everything I know as an art educator and my time spent there gave me the resources and language to demonstrate how the arts develop and strengthen learning, understanding, innovation, creativity, reflection,

## Reflections on NAEA Western Region Summer Leadership Summits

These are three places I never thought I'd ever go to in my life. Never gave them any thought. Weren't even on my radar. Leave it to OAEA to present me with the opportunity to drop these pins on my map.

The National Art Education Association divides the nation (and Canada) into four regions; Northeast, Southeast, Western and Pacific. Ohio and 15 other states (plus 3 provinces) of the midwest and great plains make up the largest region in the organization - Western. In addition to the annual national convention and delegates assembly each March, the NAEA gathers the state association leaders every summer for a leadership conference. During odd years, we meet as regions. During even years, we meet as a national delegation.

On the agenda are position statement reviews, association governance business and recognitions. The NAEA Position Statements are masterfully-worded expressions of our collective beliefs as an organization from teacher preparation, content delivery philosophies and so much more. They are powerfully written pieces of advocacy and I encourage you to get to know them at www.arteducators.org. The most engaging parts of these meetings are the state reports. Each state prepares a report limited to three slides following focused prompts from the Western Region Vice President. This is where Ohio really shines. We are such a strong state organization, proven year after year, with great leaps we have taken with 501(c)3 status, Google-for-Non-Profit, the Advocate Award and engagement of members. We all share our experiences and ideas about membership development, website

and data management, conference hosting alternatives, governance structure updates and advocacy action. Ohio leads the way in most of these conversations, too.

There is a retreat element woven into our work together. We've toured Ghost Ranch, a cowboy art museum and the Phillips Collection. We've heard Dr. William F. Baker and Jaune Quick-to-See-Smith and met Suellen Rocca of Chicago's Hairy Who group. We've had Crayola Creative Leadership Training, Gelli-printed and needle felted. There are always evening meals for parties of 15+ where we continue the conversations of the day. Our NAEA Western Region Facebook group keeps us connected in between meetings.

In 2013 as I was serving as 2nd Vice President, President Randy Robart asked me to join him representing Ohio in Oklahoma City. In preparation Randy told me to bring an artistic or Ohio-centric gift for the raffle table, a fundraiser for the hosting association. He also put me on the task for creating token gifts from our association to each of the other delegates. I learned that I really love doing this. This was also the first time we busted out the OHIO sunglasses. I was immediately welcomed by Kansas, Iowa, Wisconsin, Minnesota, Illinois and Indiana. The gracious Oklahoma hosting team (the other OAEA) even provided city drive-abouts on request.

2014 brought the reboot of the National Leadership Conference in Santa Fe. By this time I was President-elect and was star-struck by all the art ed celebrities around me. I met Molly Ray, President-Elect from Iowa, who eventually (continued on next page)

became my roommate the following summer at the School for Art Leaders. I was lucky enough to return to Santa Fe in 2015 as NMAEA hosted our next Western Region leadership conference. This time OAEA doubled our delegation by including our 1st and 2nd Vice Presidents Alice Tavani and Carrie Barnett. A highlight was the time we four had together to just think, talk and process ideas and solutions for our organization. In 2016 President-Elect Alice Tavani and I attended the National Leadership Conference in Alexandria, VA where we got to visit the new NAEA world headquarters. It's in these national encounters that I feel the closeness of our region; my familiar friends and faces from Missouri, Kansas, Indiana and others.

This past summer my service as an OAEA national delegate came to a close. I drove to Elmhurst College in Illinois to meet Alice, Carrie and 1st Vice President Matt Young to represent Ohio one last time at Western Region. We stayed in a fabulously 21st century dorm (no Rodgers Hall at BGSU here) and walked to our meetings and to town. Hosted by the incomparable IAEA team the schedule shuffled hearty doses of meeting with healthy doses of really engaging hands-on workshops and field visits. With no plane to catch, I lingered after closing making sure to give one more hug and say one more good-bye to Arkansas, Texas, Nebraska, and Michigan. This would be my last farewell to Western Region delegates and I didn't want it to end. My teaching and leading has been changed by the many inspired art educators I have encountered through this incredible five-year term of service. Thank you, OAEA, for giving me this opportunity. When I first heard about NAEA's School for Art Leaders I was immediately intrigued. The timing wasn't right for me personally, but the idea was still in the back of my head. Laura Tawill and Matt Young talked about their wonderful experience in the first ever 2015 SAL group and I was even more interested. I decided the summer of 2017 was my year to give this adventure a go... so I applied and was humbly pleased to be accepted into this group.

As I prepared for my summer intensive at Crystal Bridges in Bentonville Arkansas, I was already getting a sneak peak at the depth of this experience. In the book, "Total Leadership", I began to realize I was going to develop ME as a leader, not just learn about leadership in general. ## Cincinnati art museum Impacts OAEA Members

Years ago, Marge Hilliard, former OAEA Art Teacher of the Year and mentor to many, encouraged me to present a lesson at the Cincinnati Art Museum's Evening for Educators. I was hooked. The amazing permanent collection at the Museum has inspired me and other OAEA members to develop meaningful object-based lessons for our students and then share our lessons with educators of all content areas. Teachers toured the museum, learning about early wooden signage through the advancement of animated neon gas signs. The in-house Neonworks shop offered demonstrations of the process of bending and creating neon signs. Teachers also experienced a brush-lettering workshop. Lori Bernhardt, Bonita Taggart, Marcia Tuznik and Maggie Moschell, OAEA Elementary Division members and Melissa Sand, OAEA Communication Chair and High School Division member were among the participants of this engaging STI program provided by the Cincinnati Art Museum.

Emily Holtrop, the Museum's Director of Learning & Interpretation, OAEA Museum Member and former NAEA Museum Chair has provided innovative learning opportunities and outreach for OAEA members since 2002. The Cincinnati Art Museum hosted the regional workshop of Reaching Inner-city Youth through Art Education, an Ohio Arts Council grant written by Suzanne Mitolo, State Membership Chair and Elementary Division member and presented in Cincinnati by Dr. Jan S. Fedorenko, OAEA Distinguished Fellow. The Museum has also provided a prestigious venue for several Southwest OAEA regional awards ceremonies. Currently, Sylvia Dick and Susan Ruttle Lawrence, Higher Ed Division members, Sue Diemer, High School Division and I serve on the Teacher Steering Committee of the Cincinnati Art Museum.


## line exploration

For the past 12 years I have started each school year with a line exploration with my kindergarten students. We look for lines all around us and how most of our world is made up of a variation on some key lines. This year I wanted to push their creativity and also, as a pre-assessment, see what types of young artists I will be working with.

In advance, I glued a piece of colored yarn to scrap pieces of white matte board. We then looked at a couple of these boards as a class and brainstormed what we could turn that string into. How would our ideas change if we turned the board upside down or onto its side?

Then each student was given a randomly selected board and told to use pencil to turn their string into something, anything. Sure, we ended up with some snakes and the occasional worm. But then there were those moments where pirate eggs, t-rex dinos, and family portraits emerged.



Why not have a volunteer glue down string for you now for next year, or use this activity as a creative moment with any grade level? It could be a possible art show station. Last year I opened up a professional development day by leading my team of art educators through the experience.

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# Middle School Youth

The more time you allow your middle school students to be social the happier they will be. These students need a safe place to learn how to talk to new people in productive ways and the art room is the perfect place to do just that. Here are three ways I use social time to encourage thoughtful conversations about art criticism in my art classroom.

### **SPEED DATING**

Speed dating is a fun way for students to critique artwork with enough structure to keep the conversation safe and on topic. To make it constructive, you will need a timer and each student will need artwork, a graphic organizer, a pencil, and a clipboard. You can decide what standard or criteria to focus on with your graphic organizer depending on the needs of the classroom. Art elements, criteria for collaborative art are two ways I have used it most successfully. Students can use masterwork examples or their personal art but the whole class should be consistent.

First, use paint swatches to randomly divide the class into two groups. The red group sits around the table and the blue group finds a partner. Each person then has thirty seconds to present their artwork followed by thirty seconds of questions and note taking. After the minute, the partners switch. When the timer buzzes, the blue group rotates one place to the left while the red group remains in their seats. By the end of the round each student will have seen personal and thoughtful presentations from half the class.

## **OBSERVATION GAMES**

Making art history into a game is very important to keep interests high and the topics relevant. To help students understand and use directional words in their writing I use a specific graphic organizer that lends itself to a game very easily.

Students sit in groups of four and each student has a different

work of art but the same graphic organizer. Students must write down observations in the correct corresponding spaces and cannot repeat an observation already written by another teammate. Because each student has their own paper, all students are engaged simultaneously. I give them about twenty seconds to write their observation using complex visual art vocabulary, then they rotate their papers around the table.

This is a quick and fun way to get students to make careful observations to determine themes and commonalities between artworks. I usually use four pieces of art that depict the same content or from the same artist. For an extra stretch, I ask students to combine all of the observations into a cohesive paragraph verbally for their group or written on the paper.

#### **GALLERY WALKS**

Middle school students need time to stretch their muscles and converse with friends. Gallery walks are a great way to accomplish both goals.

My favorite way to use gallery walks is to spread out around the room many pieces of artwork based on a particular learning target. The first time they walk around the room they may only look at the artwork without speaking. After that I give them specific prompts and ask them to find the artwork that demonstrates that criteria best. I write the goal on the board to make sure my intentions are clear. Once they arrive at their destination they find a partner and explain why they made their choice. Sometimes I ask students to share their rationale with the class, and other times I am content with them sharing meaningful conversations with their peers. I listen in on their conversations to ensure they are on topic. This activity is most fun when students disagree with each other and can verbalize their arguments. I like to choose controversial artwork so students are forced to look closer or read the descriptions to learn more.

Do you know when your licensure expires? Have you made a plan to earn the necessary semester hours and/or C.E.U.'s to get relicensed? Re-licensure can seem overwhelming, but it doesn't have to be. Here are some tips to achieve your



re-licensure on time, with less stress.

#### Create and keep a folder that includes:

- 1. A copy of your current Professional License.
- 2. A copy of your current Individual Professional Development Plan (I.P.D.P).
- Copies of all transcripts, and/or Certificates of Completion of coursework you have completed since the beginning of your most recent re-licensure.

When you submit your updated I.P.D.P., make your Goals for your professional development learning as broad as possible, to ensure the coursework you complete will easily fit into your I.P.D.P. goals. Also, be sure to include one or more "Ohio Teaching Profession Standard" with each of your I.P.D.P. Goals.

### For example:

Goal 1: I will increase my knowledge of Art Education by taking applicable coursework and professional development, by reading professional articles and books, by participating in professional peer groups, as well as visit web sites to stay informed and up to date on current Art Education trends, strategies, and legislation.

Ohio Teaching Profession Standard #7: Professional Responsibility and Growth Teachers assume responsibility for professional growth, performance, and involvement as an individual and as a member of a learning community."





Attending the Conference offers two ways to earn the Professional Development Units (PDUs) you need for licensure. You can earn one semester graduate credit from the University of Dayton or up to 2.5 PDU's certified through OAEA. To decide the best approach for you consider the following:

#### **University of Dayton Graduate Credit:**

Education professionals working toward a master's degree, or a master's +30, may want to attend all two and a half days of the conference and then register their time with the University of Dayton to receive college credit. UD offers one semester credit to OAEA members for \$175.00. If you are interested in receiving credit, check out the OAEA website under Professional Development to find the pdf of the college registration form. Simply follow the instructions provided. Or, if you forget, a copy of the form will be in your conference booklet! Bring the completed form to the registration area during the conference for certification on Saturday, November 4 from 10:00 – 12noon. No money is collected by OAEA. After the conference, the University of Dayton will contact registered members for payment. Remember, you MUST attend all two and a half days of the conference to be eligible for this credit. Also, please remember that if you fill out and submit the form, you are responsible for the \$175.00 cost - NO refunds once you submit!

#### **OAEA PDUs:**

Most educators need PDUs (formerly known as CEU's) to renew or upgrade their licenses. To apply for OAEA Standard Professional Development Units, go to the OAEA website under Professional Development and look for Earning PDUs. OAEA will certify up to 2.5 PDUs for full conference attendees and one PDU if you are a workshop presenter (one PDU per workshop regardless of the number of times repeated). Print the form from the website or pull it out of your conference booklet and bring the completed form to the registration area for certification on Thursday or Friday, November 2/3 from 4 - 6pm or on Saturday, November 4 from 10:00 to 12noon.



## What are you most looking forward to at conference?


