





HEALTH AND SAFETY







One of the great benefits of being a member of OAEA and attending conference is the potential for you to earn 1 graduate credit through the University of Dayton or up to 2 PDUs (see form on page 12). The University of Dayton requires that you sign up IN ADVANCE, and the syllabus follows.

Independent Study in Art Education; The Ohio Art Education Conference

Conference Dates: November 4 - 5, 2021

Course Description

The purpose of this course is twofold:

- 1. To increase networking opportunities with art education professionals and art education students within the state of Ohio
- 2. To engage in issues and current topics pertinent to art education in Ohio through active participation in the Ohio Art Education Association Conference

Participants will be required to attend presentations by and network with Ohio practitioners, researchers, academics, students, artists, and writers in our field. Participants will also visit the commercial exhibit displays to view the latest publications and art media for classroom use.

Workshop Requirements

- **1.** You MUST enroll at the University of Dayton by October 15, 2021! There are no refunds if you do not successfully complet the course.
- **2.** Attend a pre-conference a virtual meeting on October 5, 2021 from 7:00pm 8:00pm to review expectations, answer questions, etc. A makeup virtual meeting will be help on October 12, 2021 from 7:00pm 8:00pm.
- 3. Attend a minimum of 8 conference presenta-

tions and/or media workshops, and all 3 general sessions. Proof of attendance is required. A sheet for presenters to sign will be given. For each presentation, workshop or session, list 3 of the essential key points addressed by the presenter(s). Write a 1-page reaction paper, which describes the salient points of each presentation and your perception of the importance of this information to the field of art education. Consider making comparisons to your teaching. Do the ideas presented support your work in the classroom or do they introduce different/challenging ideas. Total 11 papers. (11 hours of participating; 10 hours of reflecting and writing)

- **4.** Spend a minimum of 1 hour in the commercial exhibits to view and collect art media and publications, as well as literature about new technologies and equipment. Write a 1-page paper describing your reaction to the art media, resources, and publications from the exhibitors. What new ideas/materials for use in your classroom have you been introduced to. What curricular concepts/processes did you discover? Total 1 paper. (1 hour participating; 1 hours of reflecting and writing)
- **5.** Attend your Regional and one Divisional meeting initiating contact with fellow Ohio practitioners by Write 1 page response reflecting on what you learned during each exchange and networking. Total 2 papers. (2 hour of participating: 1 hour of reflecting and writing)
- **6.** Write a final paper addressing the prominent ideas and directions of the field of art education in Ohio at this time. Mention in the paper how this coincides with your current work in the classroom and what new ideas you want to include (continued on next page).

How will this experience impact your classroom teaching? Conclude with how this may impact the direction you are taking in your ideas about teaching. Paper should be 3 pages. Total 1 paper. (3 hours of reflecting and writing.)

Required Reading

OAEA Conference booklet. The booklet can be viewed on-line prior to and during the conference.

Grading

All papers should be written in TimesNewRoman, 12 pt. double spaces and proofed for spelling and grammar. Points awarded based on detail, clarity and proofing.



ED&I 2021 REPORT

Development of the Ohio Art Education Association's ED&I Committee

During the summer of 2020, 200 OAEA members completed a survey regarding Equity, Diversity, and Inclusion. Within this survey members were asked if they would be interested in learning more about ED&I and potentially participating in the development of an upcoming ED&I Committee. In the spring of 2021 all 50+ members who had shown interest through this survey were sent information regarding the application process for the ED&I Committee. In late summer members who had completed the application were vetted by the Executive Committee and confirmed into their new roles. This new committee is currently serving OAEA as an ad hoc committee as the Executive Committee continues to review how this integral committee will become embedded into OAEA's organizational structure.

August - September 2021

As of September 2021, the ED&I Committee has met two times. The charge given to this committee by the Executive Committee was to enhance OAEA's organizational structure, management, and capacity through an ED&I lens. As a starting point the committee has reviewed and commented on the Membership portion of OAEA's 2022-2025 Strategic Plan and are currently reviewing and commenting on the Organization portion. Edits from our review of the Membership portion have already been made to the Strategic Plan.

Moving Forward

The ED&I Committee has several items they will be working on as we move into the end of 2021 and the beginning of 2022. It is our committee's hope to have completed the review of the entire Strategic Plan before the January 2022 Executive and Leadership Assembly Board Meetings. Additionally, the committee has been approved to develop OAEA's definition of diversity and we are beginning to work with OAEA's Grant Writer to complete a grant application that would enable OAEA to develop a phased approach to ED&I Training for our organization, using NAEA's model and resources as a guide.

2020 CONFERENCE REPORT

A Conference Report by the Numbers

A global pandemic cannot stop OAEA Conference!

Right on schedule we pulled off our first virtual conference with much success! The Conference Committee worked in tandem with the Communications Committee to make it happen.

There were several positives to this kind of conference:

- You could always make eye contact with the presenter and you were in the front row (while still in your pajamas)! Your rewind feature allowed you to go back if there was something you didn't understand.
- Fifty-seven OAEA members who submitted workshop proposals, were willing to shift gears and do a video presentation. Usually our workshops have anywhere from 8 to 60 people at the workshop (and there was a chance of getting closed out of attending) but this year:

9 workshops had 20 – 45 attendees 14 workshops had 46 – 60 attendees 18 workshops had 61 – 75 attendees 11 workshops had 76 – 90 attendees 5 workshops had 91 – 112 attendees

Attendees were able to rate the presentation immediately
63% of workshops were rated with perfect scores
80% of workshops were rated 90 out of 100 or above
7% of workshops were rated 80 – 89 out of 100
11% of workshops were not rated

This team made this shift in format so flawless: Melissa Sand, Communications Chair, quickly became the quarterback of the conference; Alice Tavani, Local Conference Chair; Diane Thorpe, workshops; Sarah Hebdo, speakers; Susan Ruttle Lawrence & Adrian Vance Hawk, awards; Gayle Mulder, membership; Bev Finkel, Treasurer; Michelle Kane, marketing; Jonathan Juravich, booklet/web information; Juli Dorff, professional development; Leslie Carson, Registrar; Jacquelyn Sommer, social media; Karen Rellar, website; Abby Hanser, web editor; Sarah Shumaker, forms; Matt Young, Zoom activities.

Wrapping up my final conference for OAEA I did a great deal of reflecting. I think back on the hundreds of amazing Ohio art educators I've met over the years and how I continue to see what they are doing on social media. I remember the great and inspiring speakers we've had and the workshop presenters that are just as inspiring. I treasure the time I've spent with the Local Conference Planning Committees from around the state and watched many of those people continue in leadership positions in our association. Thanks for this wonderful opportunity to serve OAEA.
